Dealing With Cancer

We frequently hear that science has made a breakthrough in cancer or some other deadly disease, but does anybody ever notice what they always say? It will always be a year or more before it is perfected, and then we never hear of it again. I just read on the Internet about a breakthrough for breast cancer. They advised:

“A revolutionary treatment for breast cancer which destroys tumors by a blast of laser light was unveiled by doctors today.”

They went on to brag about how the treatment works and how it could replace mastectomy and radiotherapy without any bad side effects. I continued to read on knowing what was coming. Sure enough, world-renowned breast cancer surgeon Mo Keshtgar, said it “could” be available within six years. It could be if we could dig it out of the closet. There is talk now of new treatment for melanoma among other forms of cancer, but the first questions I ask is if it is available to those who need it and if not, how long will it be and how much does it cost? Their “breakthroughs” are always a treatment designed to make money. One retail price I uncovered was 13,000 times the cost of getting it to the patient. I started to imply that the manufacturer is getting rich, but everybody gets a piece of the pie.

I’m cautioning very seriously to wake up to what they are doing. The next time you hear of a discovery that will prevent or cure a deadly disease, just wait until the end of the announcement, and they will offer some reason why it is not ready yet, it should be available in a year or several years, the research is not quite complete, it is now being tested on rats, or anything they can think of to keep it from being available in the doctor’s office. I heard a man that has AIDS say that they have a cure for AIDS, but “they are sitting on it.” He followed by saying that almost everyone that has AIDS knows it. They have been using the same evasive strategy for a generation.

If you become wise to how they operate, it will become obvious that they use every imaginable excuse, or do anything to get out of making the discovery ready to be given to people that need it.

They are very encouraging unless you know before they even get started that they never intend to make any breakthrough available. The thought of that happening worries them to tears, and there is another group in the organization that has great cause for concern.

If the people involved in research find a cure for cancer, or let me rephrase that because a cure has already been found. If they allow a cure to become available, or the public to become aware of a cure, they know their money will be cut off, and the next thing they will need to find is the unemployment office. I’m sure there are many who have grown wise to what is going on but think there is nothing they can do about it. I thought the same thing several years ago, yet I discovered there are actions that can be taken that will save your life. We will be getting into cure and prevention, which includes my final assessment and conclusions on how to deal with cancer. It mainly stems from personal experience. I will explain in detail a process to go through to kill a cancer even if it is already in advanced stages - and not only how to kill it but exactly why the process works. Also, how to prevent cancer from ever invading your body in the first place.

I had reason to become knowledgeable about cancer, as I became unable to talk and had a growth removed from my vocal cords in October 2004. The first time the doctor was able to see it with his instrument, he said, “It’s cancer.” Afterward, the lab report confirmed what the doctor had said from the beginning. It came back positive for cancer. I didn’t think it was a false positive, as I had moles on my body that would strangely increase three to four times in size, then within one or two days return to normal size. In the meantime, the operation was a great success, as my voice returned to normal. I was grateful for that since it was possible that I could lose my voice. Still, cutting a cancer out is hardly ever the end of dealing with it, because, as we all know, it is very likely to come back. Conventional treatment for cancer was never a consider-

ation. I adopted an alternative program in accordance with some newly acquired information.

I had curiously been given information about how to deal with cancer a few weeks before the operation, which was actually in magazines that were two years old. My wife brought them home from a garage sale. The articles were about a naturally occurring substance called vitamin B-17, or laetrile. It is chiefly found in apricot kernels, or seeds, which are extracted when they are about the same size and texture as almonds. I was very interested in any alternative to conventional treatment, as I not only never trusted it, I like my hair the way it is.

As I began researching the vitamin, it became obvious that there is overwhelming evidence that B-17 prevents and cures cancer. After searching through everything I could find on the subject, I wound up going back to the first thing I had read on it, as it proved to be closer to my nature of telling it like it is without being concerned about what anyone else thinks about it. The article is, *Death by Doctoring*, by Steven Ransom, Research Director of Credence Publications. I will be quoting extensively from it. The two-part series was published in *Nexus Magazine* in the final months of 2002, and was extracted from Ransom’s book, *Great News on Cancer in the 21st Century*. (Credence Publications, 2002). Ransom’s works probably saved my life. I had been given a hint that there was something out there that could defeat cancer and only needed him to reinforce it and get me started on the right track.

I recall twenty-some years ago, my father related that his doctor told him if he would eat three or four almonds every day, with the brown skin on the nut intact, he would never have cancer. I learned afterwards that my sister was somehow involved in it and has followed the advice for a lifetime. I never forgot that and noticed that he always kept a supply of almonds on hand. I often wondered why a doctor would make such a statement and suspected it didn’t come from nothing and there must be something there that the public doesn’t know about. After a long session of research on the subject, I understand exactly why the doctor said that. Almonds are not quite as strong but have the same B-17 that apricot kernels have, which is contained in a highly sophisticated covering on the seed to protect it from insects. We will come back to what the covering is made of and why it works.

Apricot kernels containing vitamin B-17 and their amazing ability to destroy cancer cells is nothing new. There are almost five million links about it on the Internet, so why isn’t it widely recognized as being effective in controlling cancer? I have been coming down hard on those out on the front line with degrees, but they are only tools in the hands of the master mechanic. The heartless force behind it, or master mechanic, is called big pharma. I tend to call it the cancer mafia because the mafia that was organized as a result of prohibition were ruthless in their quest for money and didn’t care who or how many people got hurt or killed. So in that context, the term fits the drug industry very well except that gangsters humanely shot their victims, and cancer is a slow agonizing death. They are the foundation behind efforts to convince the sheeple who are afflicted with cancer to follow after a shepherd who holds degrees in one hand and golden shears in the other; or, since cancer is so deadly, would it be more fitting to say a golden dagger?

Times have changed. Through the middle part of the last century, degrees represented possession of knowledge by the extended effort of long hours of study in college. The greater knowledge was applied with honorable intent, and we were awarded with antibiotics, Novocain to kill pain, which was especially a blessing in the dentist’s office, a vaccine for small pox and polio, but then the cures came to an end. The days of cures are gone forever. Now the influence of degrees in most areas of health-care is a way to become wealthy, and some cheap cure that is available without a prescription would be disastrous. Treatment only is the plan, and as long as it’s expensive, they don’t care if it’s deadly. I am of course, referring to radiation and chemotherapy treatments. They are designed to kill living organisms and are quite capable of doing exactly that, which results in a terrible problem because radiation and chemotherapy can’t distinguish between a cancerous tumor and a vital organ, or the immune system. According to endless accounts, patients undergoing radiation and chemotherapy treatments die from some cause other than cancer because their immune system has been destroyed.

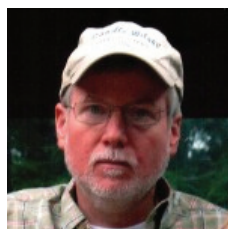

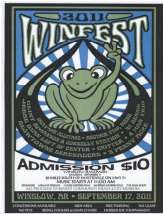

Construction to Begin on new Outdoor Music Stage

WINSLSOW-While many non-profit organizations continue to struggle during tough economic times that have dried up grants and donations, Ozark Folkways Director Rebecca Buchanan has continued to dream. And her vision for a small outdoor music stage to feature traditional Ozark music will soon become a reality thanks to a \$5,000 grant from the Pat & Willard Walker Foundation.

Buchanan said she and Folkway's board have been focused over the past few years on fundraising that keeps the doors open, but they felt the stage was meant to be after several well-timed grants and donations were received. Buchanan expects the first phase of the stage construction to be completed by mid-October.

Last year, Buchanan enthusiastically kicked off a regular monthly board meeting with an idea to "Raise a Stage" at Ozark Folkways. She said she had no idea how it would be funded at the time, but two days later, a woman with a bouquet of flowers walked into the building looking for a former volunteer who had moved out of the area. The woman would not only leave the flowers with Buchanan, but also helped her receive a \$2,500 matching grant from the Modern Woodmen of America.

Buchanan recalls, "Several days later, I was being interviewed by a local newspaper on the telephone and was the only one in the shop. A woman waited patiently at the counter to check out while I finished the interview. When I hung up, she wrote a check for \$500 for the stage project. Within a week, I could see this was really going to happen."

A donation from the Pat & Willard Walker Foundation provided the final dollars needed to complete the first phase of the construction of the stage, which will be built using cypress wood. Buchanan said this is the second year that Ozark Folkways has received a grant from the Pat & Willard Walker Foundation.

"The Pat and Willard Walker Foundation have been so generous and have allowed us to offer new programs and now, build this stage, things we would definitely have had to put on the back burner without them," said Buchanan.

A local treehouse construction company, Natural State Treehouses, will build the stage and Buchanan said they are donating a considerable amount of the labor. The stage will be constructed behind Ozark Folkways, which is housed on Hwy. 71 just south of Winslow at the top of Mt. Gaylor and features locally made art and crafts.

Buchanan said the construction of the stage will be followed by fundraising efforts to add electrical hook-ups, stone masonry, a sound system and outdoor lighting. She also hopes to enlist the help of local gardeners to landscape the stage area.

"We can't wait to hold our first concert on the stage," Buchanan said. "Our grounds are just beautiful, but we host our musical events indoors right now, which doesn't afford us a lot of space."

Ozark Folkways is a 501-c-3 organization dedicated to preserving Ozark native arts and music of the Ozarks. Ozark Folkways not only operates a store featuring local artists, it hosts a great variety of classes for children and adults ranging from stone masonry and basket weaving to fiddle camps and children's art camp.
