WINSLOW LAUNCHES EFFORT TO IMPROVE WATER SYSTEM

As of this year, Arkansas has a new law setting additional standards for public water supply systems and allowing the state to force systems that fail to meet the standards to consolidate with larger water systems. The intent of the law is to ensure that Arkansans have access to safe, reliable, and affordable water provided by financially sustainable water systems, but obviously meeting the new standards likely will be a challenge for the state's smaller water systems.

If this scenario sounds familiar, it might be because this law's approach mirrors that of the legislation that ultimately resulted in Winslow's small school system being consolidated with the Greenland School District.

The Winslow City Council and then-Mayor Chuck Dwyer first discussed in the spring of 2020 the possibility that the new law would be enacted when the state legislature met in 2021 and by fall initiated steps to prepare for that eventuality. The City contacted Communities Unlimited (CU), a nonprofit organization that, among other things, provides assistance to small towns that are planning major infrastructure projects and helps them secure funding. Winslow is being assisted by Jerry Kopke, a senior environmental management consultant with CU, who also assisted Winslow with the mid-1980s water project that essentially created the water system as it exists today.

Fortunately, the Winslow Water System has a good track record of performance and financial stability. However, the system is showing increasingly the effects of some 35 years of wear and tear on pipes, pumps, meters, and other components. Leaks in the system have become more common in the last few years and this has created more inconvenience for residents and a risk of losing customers for businesses that depend on reliable water supplies. These concerns also played a key role in spurring City action to improve the water system.

In 2020, the difference between the amount of water Winslow purchased for its system and the amount metered as sold to customers averaged more than 60 percent monthly. (The state considers 15 percent to be the high end for an acceptable loss rate.) Leakage from pipes and storage facilities, faulty water meters, and theft are among possible explanations for this "unaccounted-for water," which adversely impacts the system by unnecessarily increasing the amount the City pays for water each month, raising electrical costs for pumping, and making necessary more frequent pump repair and replacement.

Since filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Mayor Dwyer earlier this year, Mayor Randy Jarnagan has actively continued the effort to improve the water system. As the long-time mayor who preceded Dwyer, Mayor Jarnagan came to the effort being very familiar with the system and its challenges.

With authorization from the city council, Mayor Jarnagan has appointed a Winslow Water System Improvement Committee to oversee the effort and make planning and project recommendations to the city council. In addition to Mayor Jarnagan and Recorder-Treasurer Ann Malkie, the committee includes representation from city water staff, the city council, business and residential water consumers, and residents of both Washington and Crawford counties, areas of which are served by the Winslow system.

The City has begun advertising to secure an engineering firm with which to work on identifying the sources of problems with the water system and designing solutions for them. Interested firms have until May 7 to respond to the City's "Request for Qualifications," after which the committee and city council will select and negotiate with one of the firms to provide the requested services.

The successful engineering firm initially will be asked to determine the sources of water loss within the Winslow system and estimate future increases in population and water use in the Winslow area. It will then prepare a preliminary engineering plan recommending specific steps to address those findings through measures that would enable water rates to remain affordable while making it possible for the system to maintain financially stability in coming decades.

The firm and the City would then seek approval from the state Water/Wastewater Advisory Committee for its plan and for state-administered grant and loan assistance to implement the plan. With that approval secured, the firm would proceed to a full design of improvements and the preparation of bid documents for construction of the project. Once successful bids had been determined, work on the project would begin. The possibility of unforeseen delays at any step in the process and uncertainty about what construction might be needed make it impossible for now to provide a reliable estimate of when the project might come to fruition.

"It is probable that the major improvements the water system needs will not be completed until well into 2022," Mayor Jarnagan says, "but in the meantime the Winslow Water System will continue its ongoing efforts to minimize interruptions in water service, while supplying its valued customers with safe water at a reasonable cost."

Betty Lynn Miller Jones

October 3, 1944 - March 26, 2021

In the early hours of Friday, March 26th, 2021, Betty (Lynn) Miller Jones, an amazing mother and most loyal friend, was called home to be with the Lord.

Betty was born October 3, 1944, at Texarkana, AR, the only daughter of the late William Trotter Miller and Lillian Isabel Hinton Miller. She attended the University of Arkansas at Favetteville. She later moved to Little Rock and worked for Worthen Bank for 16 years, became an officer and served on the board of directors at the Little Rock Zoo, Stepping Stone, Inc. as well as other nonprofit organizations. In 1980 she left the city life to rear her daughter at the family farm on the Red River. There she successfully owned and operated a twelve-hundred-acre equine breeding and training operation with pecan orchards, wheat & soybean crops as well as a sand/fill dirt business named Footloose Farms. For 22 years Betty was the President of the Arkansas Horse Council where she was responsible for the development and implementation of the state's current equine activity liability laws, the Equine Infectious Anemia compliance laws and the Certified EIA Verifier Program. She championed programs like Second Careers for Horses that, has re-homed over 300 horses to date, and the Black Stallion Literacy Program presented in rural schools across Arkansas. She was the Founder and Executive Director of the Arkansas Equine Foundation, Inc. from 2001 until it was dissolved in 2019. In 2010 she took over from her daughter as the curator of the Thomas M. Hinton collection of art where she has meticulously cared for over 200 works. In the spring of 2018, Betty committed her passion for horses and military veterans as a co-founder and Vice President of Warhorse Legacy Foundation, in Winslow, AR. She was a lifetime member of the VFW Auxiliary Post 2952, as well as a lifetime member of the NRA.

Betty touched so many lives, human and animal; a fiercely loyal friend who worked to help her neighbor until her last day. She had a most fervent relationship with her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; therefore she did not leave this earthly plane in fear but in love and peace.

Also preceding her in death was her former spouse, Harvey P. Jones and her uncle, renowned artist, Thomas Melvin Hinton. She is survived by her daughter, Valorie Jones, of Fayetteville, AR; a cousin, Karen Winchester, of Tucson, AZ; her precious canine companions, Big Boy and Bella; her beautiful horses, Sudan, Bandido, and El Cid.

A memorial service will be held at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 7, 2021 at Warhorse Ranch, 19344 Hidden Valley Road, Winslow, AR 72959. 

From a Surveyor's Notebook

The subject of land surveying is not new. It is centuries old. The earliest records of man refer to skillful measurements with respect to land, but it is impossible to assign the birth of the science of surveying to any particular year or even country. The Chinese, at an early date, and the Egyptians, long before Christ's time, practiced the art of land surveying ("cursed be he that removeth his neighbor's landmarks"... Deut. 27:17). Every legal description is based upon a survey of the land. In order to prepare a legal description of a parcel or tract of land, someone, at some time, must have gone upon the particular land and made some sort of survey upon which the description is based.

Metes and Bounds description---

The oldest known manner of describing land is called the "metes and bounds" description. Literally, this term means the measurements and boundaries of a tract of land. Two things are of prime importance in a metes and bounds description. First, the description must begin at some known point that can be readily identified. Second, the description must close; that is, if the courses (direction) and distance of the description are followed step by step from the corner to corner, the description must close back to the place of beginning. The metes and bounds method of description was followed by the Colonists in the early settlement of this country. Most of these descriptions were vague, ambiguous, inaccurate, and difficult to accurately re-survey, and created a situation that gave rise to frequent boundary line disputes and litigation.


Historic Building Rehabilitation
