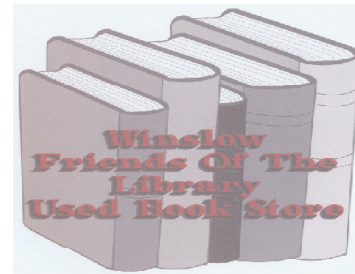

# Logic 2000

The state backed down on annexing Greenland as I predicted last month, but they would have been fighting Fayetteville as well as Greenland. The residents of Greenland made a gallant fund raising effort and undoubtedly gained some insight as to what Winslow went through losing their school. All school districts have been devastated by the outrageous price of fuel among other operating expenses and Fayetteville is probably not in any position to absorb an additional responsibility. I'm sure the state will find the same problem with any school they attempt to consolidate.

I see there are new developments in the murder case of JonBenet Ramsey. After all these years, they have finally cleared the names of JonBenet's parents, but they were only suspects for the convenience of the police. It happens all the time. Public pressure on the police to find a killer forces them to name suspects even when they know very well the suspects are innocent.

They even send them to prison knowing they are innocent just to keep the public off their back, and we all know that trainloads of them have been set free since DNA technology became available. Foreign DNA was found under JonBenet's fingernails and in her underwear right from the start. It was glaringly obvious that a match to the DNA would be the killer. They tested everyone's DNA even remotely associated with the Ramsey family and couldn't find a match so they announced John and Patsy Ramsey as suspects to settle down the roar of the public. The case had attracted national media attention and they were desperate for a suspect.

They ignored the unexplained DNA and arranged for John and Patsy to go before the Grand Jury

but the Grand Jury didn't ignore it and would not charge them. In essence, the purpose was to transfer some of the attention away from the police and to the Grand Jury.

Elected officials especially have nightmares about a no suspect situation in a highly publicized case. They must keep voters thinking they are doing an excellent job at all costs, even innocent people going to prison, in order to have better chances of being reelected. It is a sickening practice that has been going on for a long time, so what can be done about it?

The police are not going to change their tactics. It is an old strategy to relieve public pressure that probably goes back to ancient Rome and remains deeply ingrained in their system. We must accept that and become aware of what public pressure on the police is causing them to do. About one third of capital murder cases are never solved and the public needs to realize that just because there is no one in jail or suspected of a crime doesn't mean the police aren't doing everything humanly possible to solve it.

It has always been a terrible mistake to make overbearing demands on people who are already doing the best they can. If the police are having a run of bad luck, maintaining unwavering support is the way to keep them from being tempted to resort to the old proven method of relief. And unwavering support means not to say or write anything demanding action when the police are at their wits end and there is no further action possible without a suspect.

The general assumption is that police in other cities may do such a thing but not in our town - or would they?

½ t. salt

¼ t. pepper  
3 T. butter  
1 c. sharp cheddar cheese (grated)

Combine all ingredients except cheese in a greased 9 x 13 inch baking dish. (May be put together ahead of time, covered, and refrigerated for up to 24 hours.) Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sprinkle on cheese and bake uncovered for 1 hour. Serves 8.

This month, once again, we are going to do two quilt patterns so everyone can get a little ahead. This will be blocks #09 and #10, for this year, with only two more blocks for the year.

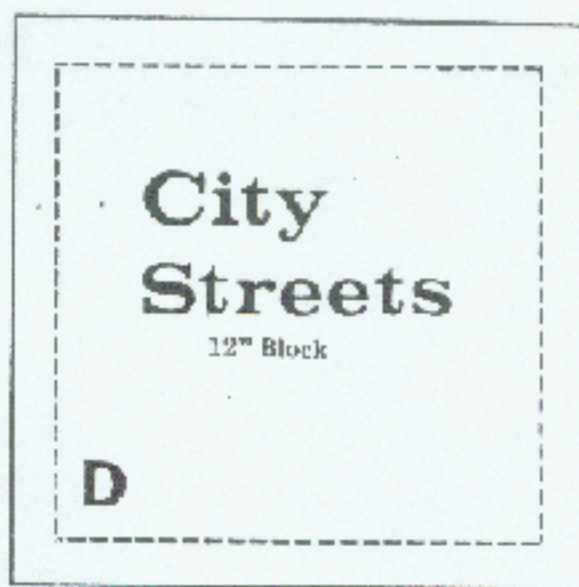
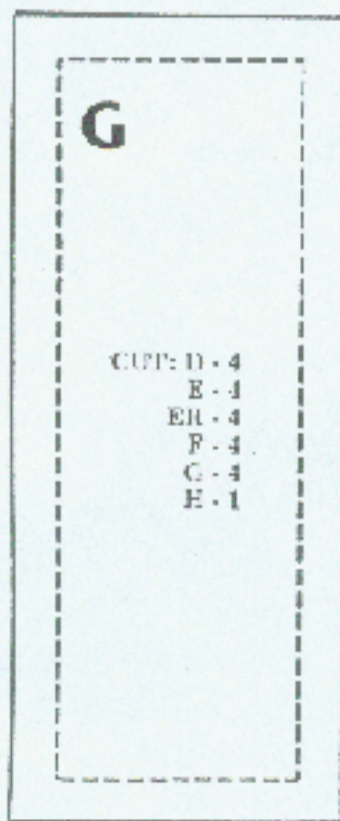
City Streets and Attic Windows are both fairly simple blocks.

Hope all of you are keeping up and can display your quilts at the Library during the Month of December. It's so exciting to see all the different versions of the same patterns.

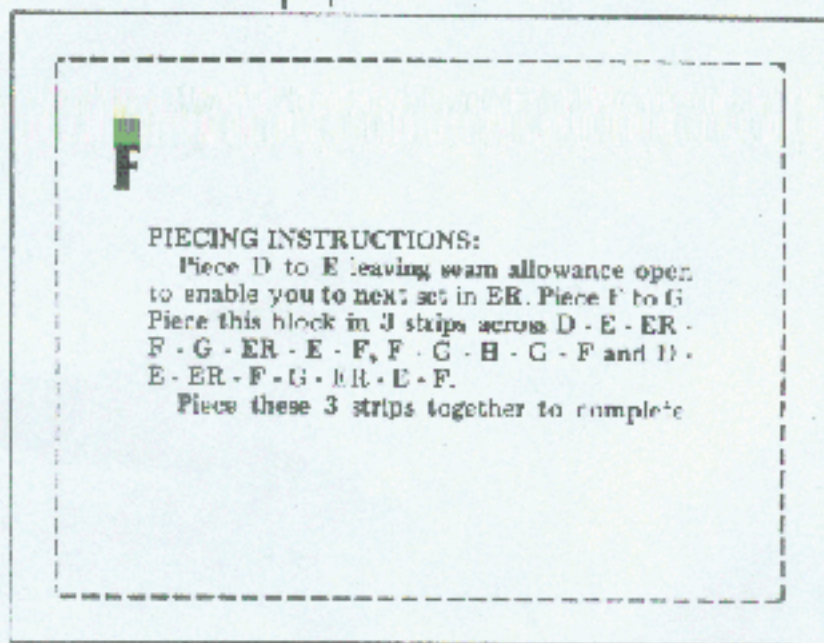
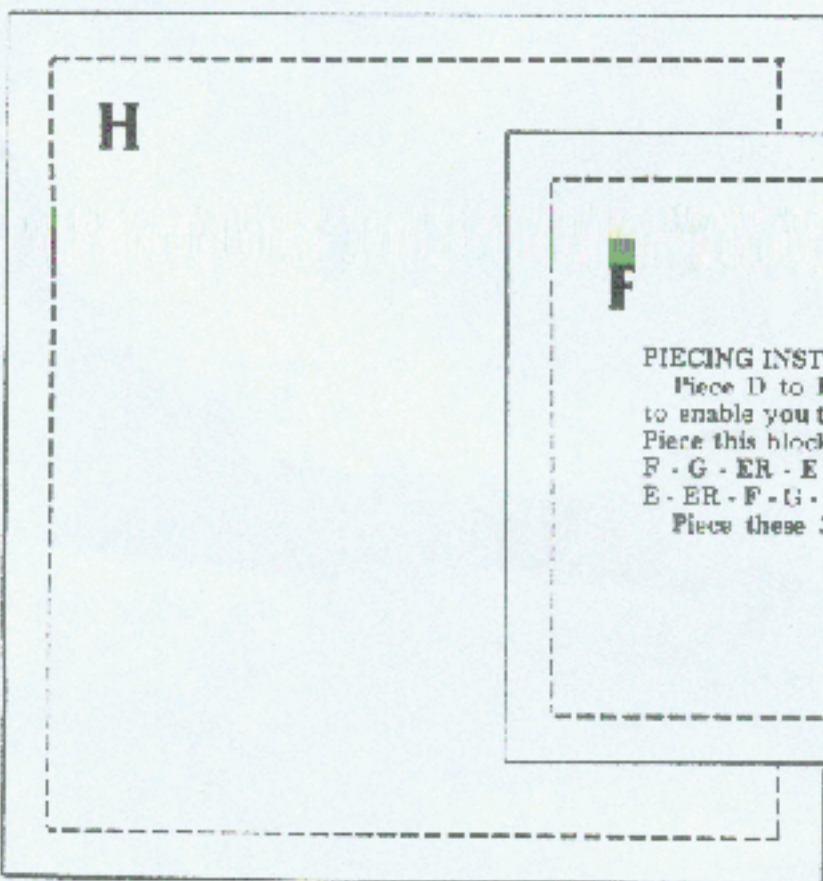
One lady picked a block she likes real well and is doing her entire quilt with the one pattern and various fabrics.

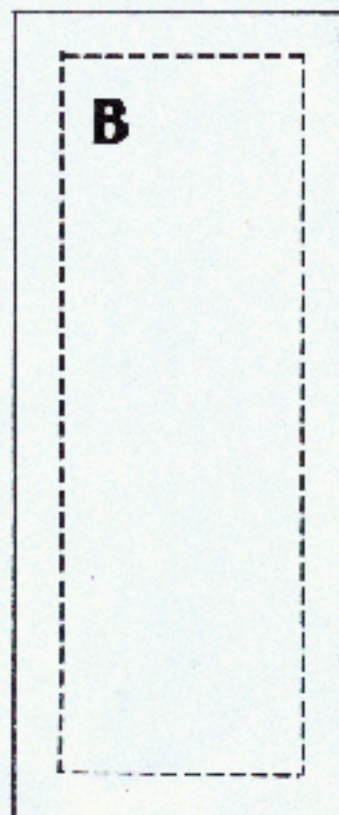
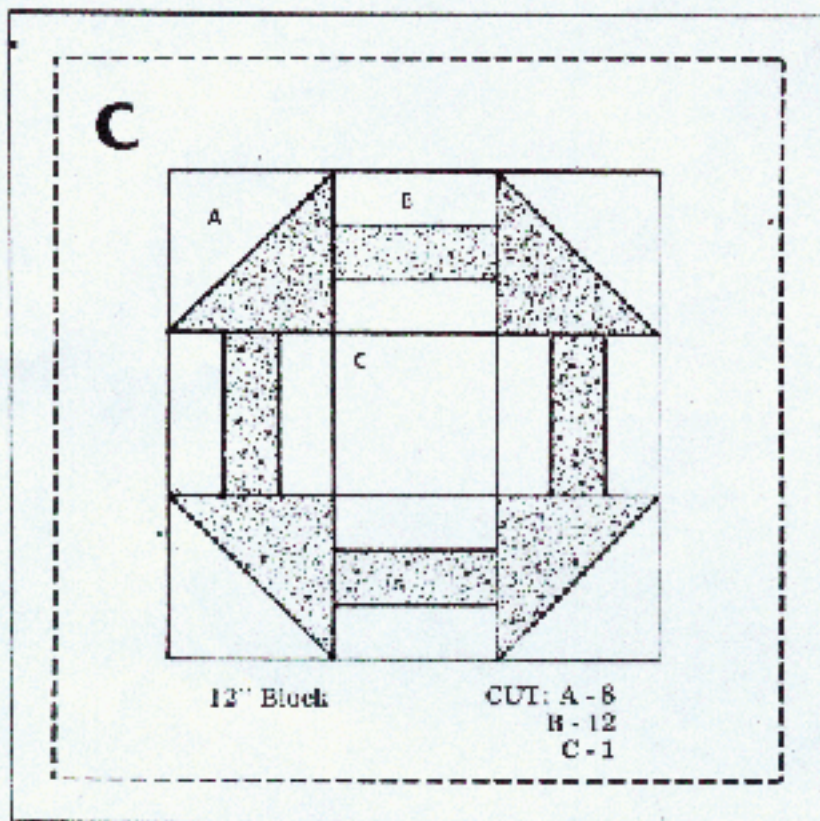
I also have a crazy quilt that I hope to have finished by Quilt Show time.

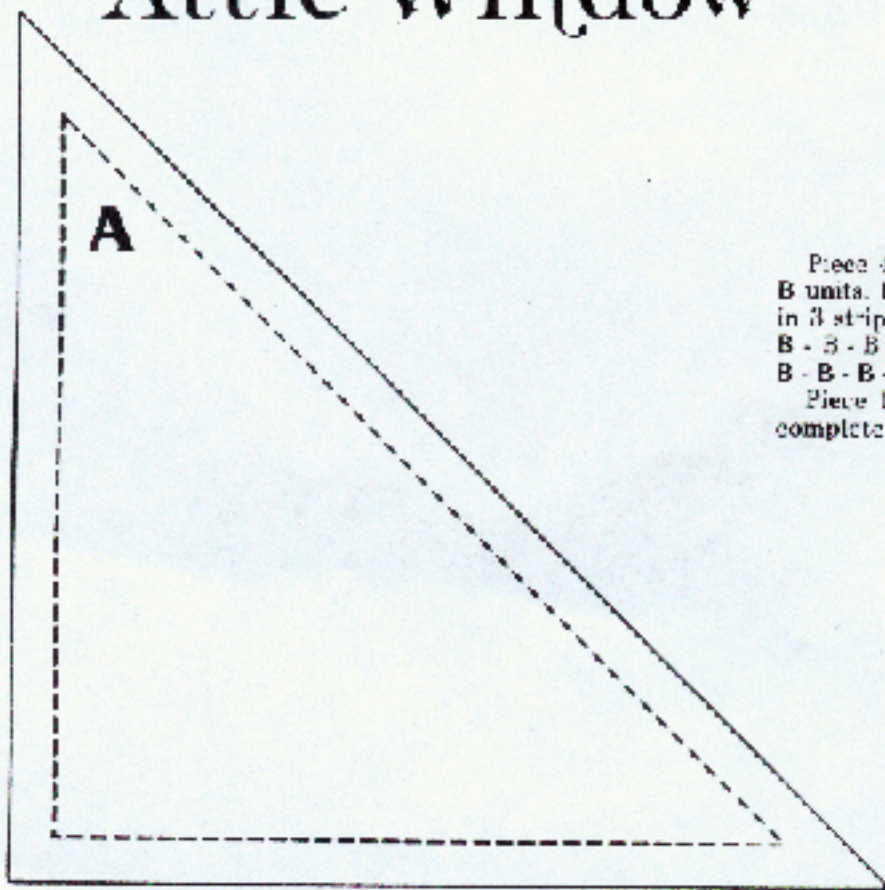


PIECING DIAGRAM

How much can you really remember about what happened last week? Last month?? Or how about fifty-three years ago.

Bobby Joe and Ellen Center just celebrated their fifty-third anniversary. Now, that's a lot of years, but more and more people are measuring their years together in scores. But, can you remember what you had for breakfast the next morning? Can you remember how much it cost? Can you even remember where you and your spouse or a friend had breakfast.

Fifty-three years ago Bobby Joe and Ellen ate at Neal's Café in Springdale, Arkansas. Bob says he's sure they had bacon and eggs, and that it cost about a buck and two bits each. And, knowing Bob, I'll bet he whipped that dough out and paid with a flare cause that was their first breakfast together after they were married and he, I'm sure, took advantage of this opportunity to impress his new bride. And, Ellen tells me they still like each other!

For many years they have lived on their ranch on Coyle Cemetery road. But things aren't the same. When they first moved to the edge of the mountain overlooking the valley leading to Shepherd Springs, there was one car a day that ventured down the road. There was no mail delivery, and the school bus couldn't get down the road to their house. Drivers that took the chance often got stuck in the ruts near his mill.

That's just part of the story. Ellen says they still like each other. Now that's the real story.

This community is full of couples who have celebrated many years together. To begin naming them wouldn't be fair because many would be left out. Our lives are founded on memories, but this is a story of memory. It is a story about the sign posts we placed along the path of our lives that give us an anchor that establishes check points to which we can refer. Birthdays, graduations, anniversaries, first dates, births of our children, or our first day at school, are all sign posts that we use to establish the road our lives have traveled, but

these all become memories. But again, this is a story about memory.

Mark Twain said, "When I was younger I could remember anything, whether it happened or not." Now, I've got to admit that I too can remember many things that happened to me or my friends in the greatest detail. I love to tell the stories of experiences and things that I have done or that someone else did that is of interest to me. I can remember names of friends or people that I have just briefly met. But, I like Mark Twain have got to admit that the minute details might really be just a little blurred with the passing of time. And sometimes, those names I remember so well might really have just popped into my head because that story really needed a name attached. What's really nice about stories from the past, is that there's not too many times that someone is standing there to challenge the details.
