A rumor is a concept that lacks a particular definition in the social sciences. But most theories agree that rumor involves some kind of a statement whose veracity is not quickly or ever confirmed. In addition some scholars have identified "rumor" as a subset of propaganda, the latter another notoriously difficult concept to define.

Rumors are also often discussed with regard to "misinformation" and "disinformation" (the former often seen as simply false and latter seen as deliberately false).

That is what Wikipedia says about Rumors. I say they are nothing but mean and deliberate ways to get back at someone that has made you mad. If a rumor ever had any truth in it, it usually has been so distorted that it ends up being a total lie.

Rumors can cause a great deal of harm to the person or persons. It seems these days the kids use this as a way to get back at someone that has made them mad. This is another way to bully.

Have you ever been the victim of such vicious rumors? Well I can tell you that it can cause depression, beat on your self confidence and make you want to stay in your room and never come out. What is Cyber bullying?

Cyber bullying is bullying that takes place using electronic technology. Electronic technology includes devices and equipment such as cell phones, computers and tablets as well as communication tools including social media sites text messages, chat, and web sites. Examples of cyber bullying includes mean text messages or emails, rumors sent by email or posted on social networking sites, and embarrassing pictures, videos, web sites or fake profiles.

Why Cyber bullying is different:

Cyber bullying can happen 24 hrs a day, 7 days a week, and reach a kid even when he or she is alone, It can happen any time of the day or night.

Cyber bullying messages and images can be posted anonymously and distributed quickly to a very wide audience. It can be difficult and sometimes impossible to trace the source.

Deleting inappropriate or harassing messages, texts, and pictures is extremely difficult after they have been posted or sent.

Kids who are cyber bullied are more likely to:

Use alcohol and drugs, skip school, experience in-person bullying, be unwilling to attend school, receive poor grades, have lower self esteem and have more health problems.

Please lets stop the rumors and cyber bullying. Go to the source of the problem and communicate with each other personally when there is a problem. Don't be responsible for being cruel and mean to someone. Make sure your facts are true and instead of hearsay.

I just wanted the people of this and the surrounding community to be aware of the continuing and growing problem and also let the people know that are harassing my children and family that I will pursue legal options if the rumors are not stopped and there is not an apology posted on the facebook page of the person that is stalking and harassing Bryanna.

This is serious business and I will not just let it go.

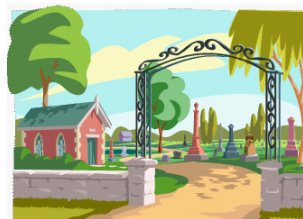

This past year was very successful for the Winslow Museum. Through a \$2500.00 grant from the Arkansas Heritage Foundation, the museum hosted several programs for Arkansas Heritage Month in May. The spotlight was on Winslow's own Maud Dunlap Duncan. Maud was a school teacher, pharmacist, Mayor of Arkansas' first all-woman city government, and owner and publisher of the Winslow American Newspaper. There is an exhibit in the museum which honors Maud and her involvement in the newspaper. Two dramas were also performed by community volunteers honoring the many accomplishments of this great lady. The museum was also able to secure a Small Museum Grant from the Arkansas Humanities Council in the amount of \$2000.00. Part of this money is being used to train a director for certification. A portion of this grant also provided a new computer, a printer, a camera, and a voice recorder for interviews. Monies will also go towards printing new brochures and reprinting current books, as well as, the creating a printing of new historical books of the area.

We would like to express our gratitude for all who participated in any of the events at the Winslow Museum. Whether visiting, acting, writing, taking pictures, or any type of volunteering, we are forever grateful. The museum could not make it without your involvement. We have many things planned for 2013. Starting in January, the 2nd Friday of every month will be designated as a volunteer day for the museum. We have a lot of work to be done organizing and making records for items in the museum. If you have an interest in helping with recording inventory either by writing or taking pictures, we would love to have your help. There are also many papers and pictures which need to be sorted and filed. If you have an interest in helping, we will be working on January 11th from 9:00 am until 2:00 PM unless the weather is bad.

In the spring, the museum will set aside one Saturday each month for a cemetery clean-up day. There are many small cemeteries in and around Winslow which get no care. We will start with St. Stephen's Episcopal Cemetery. If you are interested in a wonderful lesson in the history of some of the people buried in some of these small cemeteries, please join us for these important events. And when the weather was cold Grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls.

In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron and the men folk knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

REMEMBER:

Grandma used to set her hot baked apple pies on the window sill to cool. Her granddaughters set theirs on the window sill to thaw.

They would go crazy now trying to figure out how many germs were on that apron .

I don't think I ever caught anything from an apron - but love...



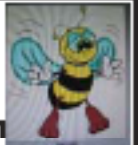

Matthew 24:3

Most of this chapter refers to Israel, however the first fourteen verses refer to the church age directly and indirectly. Three in particular stand out:

Deception:

"For many shall come in my name saying I am of Christ and shall deceive many" Deception is one of Satan's most powerful weapons.

The answer to deception is a firm understanding of the word of God which translates into a firm understanding of Christ and the cross.

False Prophets:
